Mack Beggs was born a girl. Because of that, he was forced by the UIL, the governing body of Texas high school sports, to compete with girls. He did. And last Saturday he capped off a perfect season in the 110-lb. division to capture a state 6A title in Girls Wrestling. All in all, he went 59-0 this season.

But Mack Beggs isn't a normal teenage girl. As transgender, Mack identifies himself as a boy. He has been taking testosterone to complete the transition to becoming one.

STAFF SPOTLIGHT: Ms. Kuhleman


What do you do teach here at Sharpstown? U.S History and AP World History.




Transgender Boy Wins State 6A Wrestling Title For Girls

With the guys instead of the girls, you think like the International Olympic Committee. The body, which oversees the Olympics, allows transgender individuals to compete their chosen gender if they have had at least two years of hormone therapy, which Mack has.

And it's not like Beggs wanted this. He petitioned the UIL before the year started to wrestle with boys. According to The Washington Post, "Beggs requested to wrestle against boys, though because UIL guidelines determine athletes' gender based on their birth certificate, that request was declined (citing privacy, the UIL would not discuss that request or Beggs's specific case).

Interviewed at the state wrestling tournament, Beggs' mother said, "He'd rather be
